

Tuscazoar memorabilia returns at Pig Gig campfire

The Buckeye Council B.S.A. presented several items of memorabilia to the Camp Tuscazoar Foundation at the recent Pig Gig.

Don Brown, making the presentation on behalf of the Buckeye Council, paid tribute to Camp Tuscazoar and its historical ties to area scouting. He expressed the desire for the Camp Tuscazoar Foundation and the Buckeye Council to establish a lasting friendship. The presentation drew a standing ovation from the audience filling the amphitheater.

Among the memorabilia are plaques dedicated to Frank Hoover and Dudley Unkefer. These items had been displayed at Camp Tuscazoar until scouting activities shifted to the Seven Ranges Scouting Reservation in 1986. They will be displayed during the camp's 75th anniversary in 1995.

Trustees elected at Annual Meeting

Four trustees were elected to the Camp Tuscazoar Foundation Board of Trustees during the Foundation's Annual Meeting in October. Those elected to four-year terms were Ted Novak, Don Selby, Eric Schoenbaum and Fred Gray.

Ted Novak has served as a Foundation trustee since 1987. He served three terms as vice-president until December, 1993 when he became president following the passing of Dick Schoenbaum. He began camping at Tuscazoar in the 1950's, is an Eagle Scout, and holds a fifth year pipestone. He established the Foundation's Endowment Fund and serves as chairman for the Pig Roast.

Don Selby began camping at Tuscazoar in the late 1940's. In 1952, he became an Eagle Scout. He holds a fifth year pipestone, is a Brotherhood member of the Order of the Arrow and serves as an O.A. advisor. Don is also an assistant scoutmaster and a merit badge counselor. He served four years in the U.S. Air Force and four years in the U.S. Navy Reserves.

Eric Schoenbaum has been volunteering at Camp Tuscazoar since 1989, completing and participating in numerous projects. He holds a fifth year pipestone, is an Eagle Scout and now serves as an assistant scoutmaster in Troop 34 in Canton. Eric is employed by Appalachian Outfitters.

Fred Gray's first visit to Tuscazoar was in 1963. He holds a fifth year pipestone and served as a staff member at Camp Buckeye. He is an Eagle Scout, a Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow and has served as an adult leader of Troops 14 and 159, and as on the Seneca Commissioners staff. He has an A.A.S. degree in Ornamental Horticulture and a B. A. in Business Management.

Volunteers needed as Campmasters

In the coming year, Camp Tuscazoar will celebrate its 75th


anniversary. Throughout 1995, camp events will commemorate the fond memories, proud traditions and valuable contributions that Camp Tuscazoar has fostered in its history.

Enchanted Tuscazoar Oct. 22 and 23

Where do skunks live? Why do we rarely see an owl? Come and learn more about these and other woodland animals, birds and insects at the annual Enchanted Tuscazoar event Oct. 22 and 23.

This fun, non-scary activity teaches children the habitats, history, feeding habits and more about several of the creatures that make Ohio's forests their home.

From 4 p.m. to 6 p.m., visitors will participate in walks through the Tuscazoar woods. Along the way, several animals will appear (actually volunteers in costume) to talk about themselves. After the walk, light refreshments will be served in Kimble Hall.

The cost is \$2 per person and groups will be offered their choice of a time and date.

Gold Rush offers snow, sourdough

The first event scheduled during Camp Tuscazoar's 75th Anniversary celebration is the annual Gold Rush Competition. This challenging mid-winter event will be Feb. 10-12 and is open to all youth groups that want to put their outdoor skills to the test.

Competing units (and their leaders) will build campfires, lash poles, and use a compass and their ingenuity to complete tasks at sites scattered throughout the winter woods. And, this year, units will make sourdough bread. Units are split into three competing divisions. Prizes are awarded to the top three finishers in each division.

Units may attend the competition without camping during the weekend, but must register in advance to properly prepare their sourdough bread starter. The cost for the competition is \$5 per person, which will include a commemorative 75th Anniversary patch and lunch. Camping fees are additional.

Fall Pig Gig/Pig Roast are best ever

More than 700 meals were served during the Pig Gig Campout and Pig Roast in September. Nearly every campsite was filled for the weekend campout and the warm, sunny weather on Sunday brought large numbers of visitors.
