

Construction continues on W. C. Moorhead Museum

The W. C. Moorhead Museum is rapidly taking shape on the north side of Camp Tuscazoar's parking lot. The foundation, floor, walls, roof and porch have been installed on the log cabin museum. Plans call for adding the finishing touches in the upcoming weeks.

The Camp Tuscazoar Foundation has also received a contribution from the Troop 5 Foundation to fund interior displays and showcases. Camp Tuscazoar owes a great debt of gratitude to the Troop 5 Foundation for their generous support.

The museum is a gift from William C. (Cece) Moorhead, former Foundation trustee and Tuscazoar Ranger, who passed away in 1993. In his will, he earmarked funds to assist in building the structure. Cece also left hundreds of photographs and other items for display.

Tuscazoar, the building will also serve as a meeting room, a trading post and as a check-in station for arriving groups.

Artifacts, memorabilia, photographs, or other items can be donated to the museum, or can be lent for temporary display.

Funds are needed for ongoing museum operating expenses. Volunteer manpower is needed for construction, for organizing and cataloguing donations, and to staff the museum during open hours.

Northern winds announce coming Gold Rush Competition, Feb. 9-11

Camp Tuscazoar will host its 8th annual Gold Rush Competition February 9-11. This popular event provides a polar camping experience along with outdoor competition in the frozen woodlands.

Following the Saturday morning flag-raising, competing units will travel to sites scattered throughout the camp. At each site, units are challenged to complete a task requiring camping and outdoor skills such as knot tying, lashing, first aid, orienteering and firebuilding. A judge at each site will rate each unit's effectiveness at completing the task and will assign a score. The total score will be tallied to determine the winners.

Units participating in the competition will be separated into three divisions: cub, junior and senior. Prizes will be awarded to the top three finishers in each division at the Saturday evening campfire program.

For the past few years, fallen snow has allowed competing units to use their sleds to travel throughout the camp. And, there have even been reports of bear and moose sightings.

Units may camp for the weekend or attend only the Saturday competition. The cost is \$5 per person, which includes a Gold Rush patch and lunch. Camping fees are additional.

"Days Gone By"

Camp Tuscazoar growth continued during war era

Following the construction of Dover Dam, and the relocation of many of the camp's buildings as a result, the Camp Tuscazoar we see today began to take shape.

In 1939, Scout units were offered the opportunity to "homestead" on 163 acres in the southern portion of the camp. Troops that constructed a cabin would be presented a deed for one acre. Though several troops began to build cabins, only one succeeded. Known as Troop One Cabin, this structure still stands today in the Shingask Brook valley.

In the 1940's, America's participa-

tion in World War II meant reduced funds and materials for most public programs. Nevertheless, this decade saw several major improvements at Camp Tuscazoar.

Construction began on Dan Beard Lodge in 1940, and was completed in 1941. Originally known as Hoover Lodge, this centerpiece for Tuscazoar's new Central Camp area was renamed in honor of Daniel Carter Beard, one of the founders of Scouting in the U.S., who died in 1941.

The present-day camp dining hall was also built in 1940, though the kitchen on the north end was added in the 1950s. In 1946, construction began on the new swimming pool. Construction began only after the War Production Board approved the use of the materials. The pool was completed in 1947.

Frank Hoover came to Camp Tuscazoar's aid again in 1949 when he financed the construction of Hoover Lodge and its amphitheater. This building, which rests on the site of the original Pipestone Ceremony circle, was intended as a Scout training center. Both Hoover Lodge and the amphitheater have been well used by



campers ever since.

Two additional improvements were made in 1949. First, a new power line and transformer were installed. Second, a stone gateway was added at the main entrance, a gift from the Stone family.

In the years immediately after World War II, many young men returned to camp seeking more satisfying and peaceful service as experienced camp staff members.

Imaginative programs were developed, such as the "One Horse and Up Circus" and "Dr. Pizzaro's Medicine Show and Jamboree." These staff-produced events were presented on Thursday evenings as the climax of a week-long program and were the foundation of what became a tradition of Tuscazoar staff programs.
