

## Dover Dam's doors open again for Dover Dam Weekend, May 1-3

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will once again swing open the doors of Dover Dam for tours as part of Camp Tuscazoar's annual Dover Dam Weekend, May 1-3. The tours are part of a series of activities scheduled for Saturday, May 2. The activities officially begin 8:30 a.m. Saturday when Explorer Post 2002 from New Philadelphia conducts a flag-raising ceremony in the parade grounds.

During the day, Mary Hautman from the Sippo Wildlife Center will display a variety of live animals, including a raccoon, snake and turtle, in Kimble Hall. At 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. she will present instructional programs. A geologist from the Kent State University Tuscarawas Branch will provide information and answer questions on the camp's rock formations on the lower railroad bed near the Rex Farrall Indian carving. Foundation trustee Tracy Farrall will also be on hand to discuss his father's well-known Indian carving.

In Central Camp, Explorer Post 2002 will set up a display on the Exploring program, and Bob Haas from the Wilderness Center will conduct a nature tour.

Tours of Dover Dam will begin at 9 a.m. All visitors MUST report to Duryee Lodge to be assigned a tour time. Also, throughout the day, NTR Canoe Livery will transport groups who have previously registered for canoeing trips to the nearby canoe livery.

Following retreat at 4 p.m., a 4:30 vespers service will be held at Pioneer Point by Robert C. Hahn of Troop 34. An evening campfire at Hoover Lodge at 8:30 will complete the day's activities. On Sunday morning, Rev. Stan Dickerson of Troop 146 will lead an interdenominational church service at Tom's Chapel at 9:30.


The weekend activity fee is \$3 per person, which includes a commemorative patch. Check-in for groups attending on Saturday only will begin at 8:30 a.m. Saturday at Duryee Lodge.

## Bear hunt highlights Gold Rush

Though bears have not roamed Tuscazoar's hills for many years, competing patrol units had a chance to live out a fantasy "bear hunt" during the 1992 Gold Rush Competition Feb. 14-16.

Twenty patrols traveled around the camp in a variety of weather conditions, including rain and sleet, during Saturday's competition. Highlighting the activities was the marksmanship test, which required competing units to hit a target on a life-size bear replica. The paper-and-straw bear suffered little damage as nearly every unit successfully hit the target. The patrols were also awarded points for finding nuggets of gold scattered along the camp's trails. The Eagle Patrol from Troop 72 found 107 nuggets. Troop 87's Bat Patrol finished second in the nugget competition with 82 nuggets.

Prizes were awarded for the first, second and third overall point totals. First place in the Senior Division was Troop 90's 8-Ball Patrol with 166 points. First place in the Junior Division was Troop 44's Rushing Redskins Patrol with 157 points. First place in the Webelos Division was Pack 91's Viking Patrol with 136 points. Congratulations to all units that completed the day's competition in the less-than-ideal weather.



## Camp to host "Enchanted Tuscazoar" activity

Camp Tuscazoar will host "Enchanted Tuscazoar," a safe, exciting and educational Halloween experience for interested youth groups on Oct. 31 and Nov. 1. The event will feature a walk through the forests of Tuscazoar. There, the visitors will meet and learn about various "woodland animals."

Refreshments will be served in Kimble Hall following the walk. The cost for the "Enchanted Tuscazoar" event will be \$1.50 per person. Groups will be given a choice of date and time and every effort will be made to accommodate the group's choice. Adults and older youths (6th grade and up) will be needed to assist with parking, refreshments, tour guides, animals and check-in. About 50 people will be needed each day to run the event.

## Materials needed for '92 projects

The Camp Tuscazoar Foundation's Property Committee has outlined a series of maintenance and repair projects for 1992. The Foundation is in particular need of 2 or 3 electric ranges and refrigerators. In addition, the following materials will be required:

- Roofing shingles and felt paper
- Framing lumber (2x4" etc.)
- Bricks and chimney tiles
- 12-2 electrical wire with ground
- Treated lumber (2"x4", 4"x4", 2"x6")
- Limestone
- 1/2" plywood or equivalent for roof sheeting
- Bags of mortar and concrete mix
- "A" elbows and outlet tubes for downspouts
- Replacement garage doors (4)
